PSALM 133.1

How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!

It is good when we dwell together in unity. But it sure is fun to root against a villain! David had Goliath, Jesus had Judas, The Apostle Paul had the Romans, and NFL fans have....the Patriots.

I gave a full review last year of why they're soooo unlikable. They're cheaters, ruthless decision-makers cutting players when they no longer serve as a means to their ends, and worst of all, very successful. I heard one guy liken the Patriots to stink bugs—no matter what you do to keep them out of the Super Bowl they always seem to find a way in.

MATTHEW 5.43–44—RULE 5.44

Rule 5.44. We’re all on the same team.
